### **A First Glance**



Fall came a bit late to Racine, Wisconsin, this year: the trees hadn't quite turned in mid-October when a bunch of UU ministers from around our district got together for their annual retreat on Lake Michigan. I attended with them, as usual, and again, as usual, I was a little ambivalent about retreating this time of year and not much looking forward to the trip.

But then, again as usual, it all turned to be very worthwhile.

This year's program immediately struck a deep cord with the gathered clergy professionals. If the title of "Sexually Healthy Congregations" had been a little daunting, our presenter, Rev. Debra Haffner of the Religious Institute, helped usher us into some important and timely discussions of what the concept of sexual health might mean.

In the two and a half days we were together, we worked our way down through several layers: talking about becoming sexually healthy adults and sexually healthy religious professionals ourselves, helping our congregations to become more sexually healthy, and also working toward becoming a more sexually healthy movement and denomination.

Late in the program, when we broached the subject of sexual abuse, the amount and depth of pain within our small gathering was surprising to many of us. Among just 30 or so ministers, there were lots of stories of childhood sexual abuse, date rape, and sexual harassment – the pain of which continues to haunt people months, years, and decades after the fact. Especially troubling to some, clergy misconduct is far more pervasive within our ranks than many of us ever want to imagine or admit.

On my way home from Wisconsin, I thought about the areas in which our congregation already has policies in place that address some of these issues - our 'Safe Congregations' and 'Disruptive Persons' policies come immediately to mind. Areas where we have no policies in place at the present time include: online interactions among staff, lay adults, and minors; commonly-agreed-to rules for use of Facebook, Twitter, and other social media sites; and full online versions of the 'safe congregations' and 'disruptive persons' policies.

The once-private and hush-hush issues around sexual health are now thankfully becoming more public, brought to the forefront by ministers and church members alike after years of keeping too quiet and not knowing how to help one another with the pain. If you need to talk, please call your Care Team representative or your minister, me.

Hopefully in this process, we're finding a new start toward healing for many and increasing health for us all. See you in church,



### Donations to the Alton Crisis Food Center

All of the more than 47 million Americans, including 22 million children, who receive food assistance under the Supplemental



Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps) will see their benefits cut this fall. That's because a modest boost in benefits for all SNAP recipients that policymakers included in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) to strengthen the economy and ease hardship expires on October 31. Beginning November 1, every SNAP household in America will face cuts to already modest assistance to purchase food. For a family of three, that cut will mean a reduction of \$29 a month — \$319 for the remaining 11 months of the fiscal year — a serious loss for families whose benefits will, after this cut, average less than \$1.40 per person, per meal.

"Millions of families' budgets have been stretched to the breaking point during the economic recession and the long recovery," stated Stacy Dean, Vice President for Food Assistance Policy and an author of the report. "Whether someone has lost a job, or is working at a job that does not pay enough to keep food on the table, this modest increase in food assistance is providing a vital lifeline to keep families afloat."

The Crisis Food Center, down the street from the church, is always in need of donations of food items. The Center is in need of canned green beans, corn and other vegetables; tuna; canned meat; peanut butter; boxes of mac 'n cheese; and basic food staples.

Please do not put personal care items in the Food Center box located in the RE foyer. Personal care items should be put in the taken to Emerson Place room.

# Report on 10/8/13 Board Meeting

We had another productive and collaborative meeting, discussing several pending items and plans for the future.

We accepted the Building Committee's report on the status of the Education Wing window **replacement** project. Lee reported that the lowest bid was from JUN and was accompanied by that firm's desire to improve its relationship with the Church and its members given the delay in completion of the kitchen renovation. The Committee has accepted the bid, which will also include a heating/cooling device for the minister's office for a total project cost of \$70,400. The contract will include a \$200/day penalty for late performance after a completion date is established (by receipt of the windows from a St. Louis manufacturer). PJ, the owner, will be the project manager, and everyone is hoping that the installation will be completed by or during January, depending on the time required for window manufacture. Given these plans, there may be a small amount of money available in the Capital Fund at the end of the Window Project for another to-be-determined small project.

We reviewed **draft September financials** with the understanding that work is still needed in categorizing all line items so they flow automatically into the reports. As anyone knows who has been through a software installation or conversion, it isn't automatic until it's been used, corrected, adjusted and used again...several times. As of September, we know that expenses were about \$800 over income, and that pledges are down. The quarterly statement of pledge/receipts will go out soon to members so that they can catch up on any pledge payments missed during the summer so that the October report can be balanced.

We also set December 15 as the date for the **Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting.** That meeting will include distribution of a financial report of income/expenses and comparison to the budget as well as a report on monies received from local UU churches and the Board's priorities in using that money to stabilize and grow the Church. At the May annual meeting the Congregation approved a motion

that the Board "explore taking \$25,000 from the Endowment Fund for the FY2013-14 operating budget" because it would require a change in the Bylaws to do so. During that exploration and given receipts from local churches, the Board determined that it would not be necessary to use money from the Endowment Fund over and above the normal annual contribution. To prevent a delay in the future if extraordinary circumstances require a special donation from the Endowment Fund, the Board is presenting an amendment to Article IX, Section 5 of the ByLaws stating:

In the event that the Board deems it necessary to withdraw funds from the Endowment Fund over and above the spendable income formula, it will provide the congregation with an explanation of the need for such a withdrawal thirty days prior to the meeting as part of the notice of a regular or special congregational meeting. Such a special fund withdrawal, as proposed by the Board and/or revised at the congregational meeting, requires a motion to that effect approved by a 2/3 majority of those members present and voting.

We will put this information in a link from the Church This Week e-mail as we get closer to that date along with a link to a full copy of the ByLaws with the proposed language. We are providing the amendment at this time so that those concerned with this issue have time for advance review and study. Anyone who would like a full copy of the proposed ByLaws can send me an e-mail and I'll provide it.
